### Military, Colonial, and Ideological Tactics Unite India and Israel

In 1974, India became the first non-Arab country to recognize the Palestinian Liberation Organization as the sole representative of the Palestinian people. Six years later, it voted for a UN resolution recognizing Zionism as a form of racism. India sanctimoniously embraced a policy of non-alignment for decades as it attempted to become a leader of the Third World. But these selective gestures of solidarity with colonized peoples do not erase the foundational role of settler colonialism in Indian statehood. India's occupation of Kashmir makes it a longtime peer of "Israel" — an entity with whom it has always shared political goals and military tactics.

India's historic displays of solidarity with Palestine have concealed decades of backdoor military ties with the "Israeli" state. As the global economy expanded in the 1980s, and as pressure built amongst Indian elites to privatize and deregulate the economy, India looked to "Israel" as a conduit through which to build closer ties with the United States. Over the last three decades, India has liberalized its economy, ramped up its violent wars against resistance groups in Kashmir and in Central and Northeast India, and drew diplomatically closer to the U.S. In turn, India has established a powerful tripartite relationship with "Israel" and the U.S. in defense, intelligence, and business.

#### Military Collaboration

The Indian government began collaborating with "Israel" long before Narendra Modi's rise to power. When India found itself ill-equipped to fight in the high altitudes of the Himalayas during war with China in 1962, then-Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru reached out to David Ben-Gurion for assistance, requesting he send military aid to India in unmarked ships. Ben-Gurion, known as "Israel's" founding father, insisted that the ships fly the "Israeli" flag and India accepted, precipitating a long-term transactional relationship between the two warmongers. "Whereas the inhabitants of the Indian peninsula are Hindus whose hearts have been full of hatred towards Muslims, India is the most important base for us to work there from against Pakistan," Ben-Gurion said in 1967. "It is essential that we exploit this base and strike and crush Pakistanis, enemies of Jews and Zionism, by all disguised and secret plans." Only a year later, Indira Gandhi created the Indian intelligence agency RAW — and instructed her spies to

Ruthless in its conniving balance of imperial ambitions and hollow anti-colonial rhetoric, India is a craven ally of "Israeli" occupation. Behind the spectacle of Narendra Modi giving Benjamin Netanyahu a bear hug are the Indian capitalists whose material support fuels India's zealous partnership with the Zionist entity.

Indian corporations commit vast amounts of capital to critical components of "Israel's" genocidal campaign, facilitating the manufacture of everything from rockets, explosives, drones, weapons, and armored vehicles to cloud computing and banking services. Major Indian conglomerates, including Tata, Reliance, Adani, Infosys, Mahindra, Wipro, and many others, have collectively invested billions of dollars in the Zionist entity's architecture of occupation. These investments span the sectors of agriculture, pharmaceuticals, military, and technology — a total economic embrace.

The United States, of course, plays a decisive role in the maintenance of Zionism and the Zionist entity. To secure its own hegemony and imperial interests, the U.S. has long served as the hosting grounds for Zionist functionaries to build relationships with international right-wing forces, including Hindu nationalists. The U.S. oversees a nexus of international trade and finance through austerity-enforcing

imperialist institutions, like the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the World Bank, which pressure and incentivize countries to engage favorably with the U.S. and its allies, including the apartheid state of "Israel."

As in other parts of the world, these forces of austerity pushed large swaths of the Indian population into a constant state of exploitation, while also nurturing a capitalist class that does the bidding of the American empire. Rewarded with subsidies and protections, private capital has repeatedly positioned itself as fascism's most reliable friend.

The surge in support for supremacist ideologies — namely, Islamophobia, Brahminism/casteism, and regional dominance — has made pro-Palestinian lip service less necessary for India's political leaders. Meanwhile, the West continues to invest in the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor, embracing India as both a bulwark against China and a strategic market for weapons and green energy. As a friendly West makes concessions that India has sought for decades and presents "Israel" as a strategic alternative to Moscow for arms and energy needs, a pro-"Israel" stance is only logical for India's unscrupulous, self-interested leaders. As the second-largest trading partner in Asia, and seventh-largest globally, India has emerged as an im-

portant economic partner for "Israel" and vice versa. Bilateral trade (excluding defense) between India and "Israel" grew significantly from \$132 million in 1990 to \$10.7 billion in 2023, with a diversified portfolio including diamonds, petroleum products, chemicals, electronic machinery, and high-tech products.

India has always relied on private corporations as conduits of foreign investments in order to fulfill its ambitions of growth. In 2022, the Adani Group, one of India's most politically powerful conglomerates, acquired the largest port in "Israel," the Port of Haifa, a key stop for the trillion tons of weapons deployed against the resistance and civilians in Palestine. Adani manufactures weapons and drones directly for the Israeli Occupation Forces (IOF); in partnership with Elbit Systems, they operate the only Hermes 900 drone manufacturing facility outside "Israel." Similarly, Indian conglomerates Infosys, Wipro, and Mahindra Group have significant ties to "Israel's" defense and technology sectors — some of which are mediated by the U.S. government. Infosys supports "Israel's" apartheid infrastructure and U.S. arms manufacturers with strong connections through its IT subsidiary Panaya. Wipro, through its subsidiary Wipro-Givon, supplies aerospace parts for Lockheed Martin's F-35 jets (often

sent to the IOF) and has a plant in the United States. Mahindra Group collaborates with Israeli Aerospace Industries on cybersecurity tools, expanding their use in India and reselling them to "Israel."

In return for their fidelity, Indian capitalists enjoy state support without facing state control. The arrangement grants the Indian business elite substantial power to expropriate surplus capital and exert boundless influence over nearly every dimension of social life. A primary example is Tata, a pre-independence company founded with the blessings of the British Raj, colloquially known as the 'salt to software conglomerate.' Tata is often credited with laying the very foundations for Indian capitalism. Indeed, by masquerading as a philanthropic force while abusing control over essential public goods to build infrastructures of death and destruction, Tata exemplifies Indian capitalism.

The infrastructures of death built by Indian capitalists — both at home in India and abroad in states like Israel — are not only roadmaps of complicity. They are also roadmaps for action — detailed instruction manuals for where and how to strike at the facilitators of settler colonialism and genocide.



Tata, a behemoth synonymous with Indian capitalism itself, stands out as a prime example of private capital's complicity in genocide. Tata must be stopped — and we will do it together.

The capitalist class defends its violent interests by creating and maintaining a monopoly over war-making. Indian capitalists, from Adani, Reliance, and Wipro, to Infosys, Mahindra, and Tata, are no exception. The only way to strike at the settler war machine is to target alliances between capital and genocide. As anti-imperialists and anti-capitalists, SALAM believes we must fight where we and these corporations are: here in NYC.

From manufacturing weapon components used in the mass slaughter of Palestinians, providing banking services to Zionist settlers, maintaining cloud computing infrastructure for the "Israeli" government and the IOF via Project Nimbus, to supplying armored vehicles to patrol stolen Palestinian land, Tata has established significant ties with "Israel" through its various subsidiaries and business ventures. Tata Boeing Aero-space Limited, Tata Cisco Alliance, Tata Lockheed, and Tata Consultancy Services (TCS) along with its Banking Services Bureau (BSB) are key in this equation.

**They are complicit.** Tata produces many components of "Israel's" genocidal infrastructure, including weapons, banking services to Zionist settlers, cloud computing infrastructure for the "Israeli" government and the IDF via Project Nimbus, and armored vehicles to patrol stolen Palestinian land. They have also joined forces with the extreme right-wing government of Narendra Modi, embedding themselves into the government-run Atmanirbhar or 'Make in India' agenda.

**They are liars.** Tata benefits from cultivating a false image of benevolent industrialism and philanthropic community-building while actively engaging in the death and destruction of our communities.

**They are everywhere.** Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), which provides IT and banking services to the "Israeli" project, has offices and facilities located at 101 Park Ave, New York and on Cornell's Roosevelt Island campus. TCS is also the primary sponsor of the New York City Marathon.

# Forging Unity In Action

## Workers Challenge India's Complicity in Genocide

On a single day this February in the Indian city of Lucknow, fifteen thousand men traveled long distances and waited for hours to submit their applications for jobs on "Israeli" construction sites. This was driven by the governments of India and "Israel" signing a labor deal, under which India began dispatching its workers to literally build the Zionist project. Capitalism cannot survive without a mass of unemployed people. Migrating for work across borders has been central to maintaining this system, now being facilitated by exploitative regimes solidifying their cooperation across sectors.

With no shortage of capital flowing freely from the U.S., "Israel" is in constant need of cheap labor. "Israel" has always wantonly abused Palestinian labor under a draconian system of apartheid, permits, and surveillance, forcing Palestinians to build the foundation of their own destruction. But since maintaining a Palestinian labor force would contradict "Israel's" demographic goal of ethnic cleansing, they have begun importing migrant labor from the Global South to replace Palestinian workers. The drive to replace Palestinian labor has intensified since the revocation of work permits for Palestinians beginning on October 7th, 2023, and India has emerged as a loyal ally in this effort.

India had previously inked agreements to send workers to Taiwan and Japan as part of a broadening "labor diplomacy" strategy. Recently, it signed a deal to send 100,000 construction workers to "Israel," with direct government involvement in the recruitment process, facilitating extortion through fees and excluding Muslim workers. Since March 2024, 6,000 workers have been sent, adding to the 18,000 Indian care workers already in "Israel." The script reads familiar: workers from the

Global South, who face dire economic conditions at home, are driven to seek employment abroad. Grappling with the highest degree of unemployment and inflation seen in decades, workers in India are desperate, and the government is eager to export this discontent.

Amid extreme economic precarity and with the world's second-largest army and police force, the Indian government has little trouble crushing resistance as it imposes a brutal dilemma on its people: accept destitution or participate in genocidal labor. Already bogged down by the growing strength of the Hindu right, organized labor has little bargaining power in the country. And yet, trade unions in India have shown significant demonstrations of solidarity. From political education to material disruption, workers across sectors are challenging Indian complicity in genocide.

workers away under more precarious conditions than the economic destitution back home.

### Millions of Farmers Against Zionism

Agricultural workers of India are at the heart of the India-"Israel" relationship, with agriculture being a key sector of collaboration, right after defense. Coordinated primarily through Mashav, a Zionist agency set up to evade boycott through agricultural development programs in the Global South, "Israel" has established tens of agri-tech transfer centers across India. It runs multiple water management projects and regularly conducts trainings with farmers. Representing itself as the "responsible," and thus legitimate steward of Palestinian lands, the Zionist entity uses these "innovation" export programs as a form of settler-colonial erasure.

India's agrarian community is crucial in its labor landscape and has led the world's largest peasant movement against privatization of agriculture. AIKS, the largest farmers organization in India, with a membership of nearly 15 million farmers across 27 states and closely connected to the Communist Party of India, was one of the central forces in this movement. AIKS endorsed BDS in 2017 and supports Palestinian liberation. The following statement was made for this publication.

make friends with the "Israeli" Mossad More than two decades of joint "Israeli" Occupation Forces-Indian Army training exercises and transfers of weaponry and surveillance equipment from "Israel" to India have further cemented a strong defense relationship. Since 1999, when "Israel" supplied India's offensive against Pakistan with mortars and laser-guided missiles, the relationship has ballooned into annual purchases worth \$1 billion in weapons from "Israel," including "Israeli" sensors, Heron drones, and assault rifles that are used to target and silence Kashmiris. Since 2014, India has been the largest purchaser of "Israeli" weapons on the planet. India exports its population, too, sending workers to "Israeli" construction and care sectors.

Amid the ongoing genocide, "Israel" is looking for new partners to counter pressures on Western universities to sever ties with "Israel." India has in turn been a willing and reliable partner for "Israeli" universities and weapons companies. Emerging relationships between universities and weapons manufacturers have bloomed into new hubs of defense and technology research for both state projects.

### Settler Colonialism

The Zionist state has long inspired and materially supported India's settler-colonial occupation of Kashmir. During the Kashmiri armed insurgency in the 1990s, the "Israeli"-trained Indian Army used "Israeli" weapons and counterinsurgency tactics against the people of Kashmir — including large-scale massacres, torture, sexual violence, preventive detention, extrajudicial killings, and home demolitions, wherein the Indian Army destroyed entire neighborhoods and villages in a brutal attempt to crush dissent. The Indian military has continued to seize, occupy, and enclose vast stretches of land in the region for military operations and training without approval from civilian governing bodies (now an estimated >50,000 hectares), making Kashmir the most militarized region on earth. This laid the groundwork for India's "Israeli"-inspired settler colonialism, seizing "abandoned" or "absentee" Kashmiri land as public in order to later turn it over to settlers.

### Hindutva-Zionism

For the RSS, a paramilitary volunteer-based organization that cultivates the foot soldiers of Hindutva and is a prime inspiration for the BJP, "Israel" has long been viewed as the ideal. Beginning in the 1940s, membership in organizations affiliated with the RSS grew across the U.S. The Hindu right modeled itself on the Zionist lobby, borrowing strategies such as the harassment of students and academics, frequent lawsuits, media disinformation campaigns, and a facade of progressive values weaponized to accuse critics of bigotry.


American affiliates of the RSS have grown and more regularly collaborate with Zionist organizations — conducting joint advocacy, co-hosting events, arranging diplomatic visits, and often even sharing personnel. In short, the rise of the Hindu right in India has ushered in a new phase of the India-"Israel" relationship: one in which India is a key global partner in manufacturing both material military equipment and consent for the genocide against the Palestinian people.

# The Kashmiri Bond With Palestine

## Hafsa Kanjwal on Shared History and Struggle

The brutal execution of 12-year-old Muhammad al-Durrah in September of 2000, a few days into the Second Intifada, radicalized me. I was just around his age and the image of his father shielding him from the “Israeli” gunfire, the boy’s face in absolute fear just seconds before he was shot, remains imprinted in my brain. The next few months, I was glued to the TV, watching young Palestinian boys throwing rocks at “Israeli” tanks, in awe of their bravery against “Israeli” military might.

These scenes reignited memories of the 1990s in Kashmir, a period marked by armed resistance and a mass popular uprising — inspired by the First Intifada — against Indian rule. Amid the brutal war crimes committed by the Indian army, my family left Kashmir for the U.S. Growing up, I heard Kashmir and Palestine spoken about in the same breath — in the fervent prayers of the faithful and in the resigned explanations of the elders: yih chu Palasteenus

manz ti gasaan (this is what happens in Palestine, too). Al-Durrah and the other young Palestinian boys felt like my own brothers and cousins; when I attended my first protests for Palestine, I was marching for Kashmir as well.

The Kashmiri bond with Palestine goes beyond the shared historical struggle for liberation or the realization that our oppressors share tactics. It’s rooted in a condition: of possibility, of human resilience, of spirit and faith, but also of constant disappointment amidst ongoing colonization. I felt this acutely when I first visited Palestine in the spring of 2010. The narratives of intergenerational trauma and fortitude, the stories of the martyrs and the fighters, felt achingly familiar. (I remember a young Kashmiri man who lost one eye to Indian pellets during a protest, only to say that he was ready to give his other eye the next day.) There were the everyday negotiations and compromises, too, in the way that so many people’s

livelihoods were tied to the occupying power, the stinging betrayals of those who sold out the cause.

Kashmiris, like Palestinians, know what it means to be deprived of not only our homes, land, and livelihood, but also our dignity. What it’s like to ask a thief for your rights, to bow your head before an armed intruder, entreating them to release a relative from prison or to hand back a confiscated passport — these are the humiliations imposed by settler colonialism on both our peoples.

The most sinister tool in the arsenal of an occupying power is the narrative of its own inevitability. So many of us have come to internalize this sense of inevitability. Seeing Palestinians insist on the truth of their own history has returned me to my own. I am twelve again, watching, in awe, transfixed by the dawn of another world — where the death of our martyrs will not be in vain.

## Unwavering Resilience: An Unnamed Kashmiri Comments on Solidarity

“Israel” serves as a constant source of inspiration for the Indian occupation of Kashmir, including for India’s intense repression of Kashmiri speech, protest, and life. Occupation makes a struggle out of daily life and attempts to impose a totalizing silence on Kashmiris who speak about this struggle. But like Palestine — in the face of violence, criminalization, and erasure — Kashmir still speaks. SALAM interviewed a member of Kashmiri civil society on the parallels between Palestine and Kashmir, the solidarity between the two, and the current sociopolitical moment. Citing safety concerns, they have chosen to remain anonymous.

**On Kashmiri solidarity through history:** Facing their own brutal occupation, Kashmiris are painfully familiar with the loss, dispossession, and suffering of

Palestinians. The Jammu massacre, the RSS-planned ethnic cleansing of over 500,000 Muslims in Kashmir, happened only a year before the Palestinian Nakba.

Kashmiris have not shied away from using terms more closely associated with the Palestinian struggle to describe their own movements. Intifada and Nakba are just two such examples. While Intifada was first used as a descriptive of the Kashmiri resistance in early 90s, it has been more powerfully deployed since the 2008 and 2010 mass uprisings of 2008 and 2010 in Kashmir. Pictures from these uprisings of young men facing armored vehicles with nothing but stones bear a striking resemblance to street protests in Palestine.

**On Kashmiri students and the Indian ban on public solidarity:**

The only student organizations permitted in Kashmir are those backed by the state; those that support Palestinian liberation, like the Islami Jamiat-e-Talaba (the oldest and largest student organization in Kashmir), are banned. In an attempt to silence an entire people, all expressions of resistance — no matter how small — are repressed in Kashmir. At this year’s historic Muharram procession in the capital city of Srinagar, which took place for the first time in a decade, participants raised the Palestinian flag. In turn, the state booked these participants under the draconian Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA). The point I am making is that, despite this immense suppression and a high cost of speaking, Kashmiris continue to express solidarity with Palestine.

**On oppression before, during, and after October 7th:**

For Kashmiris, what stands out is both the unwavering resilience of Palestinians in Gaza in the face of a geno-

cide and that their faith in God is the source of this resilience. October 7th has shown that liberation comes at a cost and through massive sacrifice. It has lifted the masks off (if any were still on) the faces of the ‘liberal’ world, exposing the inadequacy of international law when the occupier is backed by the Empire.

The overarching vocabulary to describe the Kashmiri condition that the Kashmiris themselves use is one of zulm — a Kashmiri/Urdu/Persian/Arabic word that roughly translates to “oppression.” I think it is important to focus on the vocabulary used on the ground. Words that are understood across borders as if they were part of the vernacular, in my opinion, show us the true nature of these resistance movements and their interconnectedness. A seventy-year-old from Gaza and a seventy-year-old from Kashmir may or may not know the English word “genocide,” but both will immediately recognize “zulm” as a part of their common vocabulary.

about \$1 billion in “Israeli” arms each year.

2009 Maharashtra forms special commando units, trained by “Israel” and deployed in the state capital, Mumbai. The city’s police commissioner publicly declares that India needs a more militarist approach and should learn from “Israel’s” “killer instinct” and unapologetic response to criticism.

2015 India abstains from voting for an United Nations Human Rights Council resolution condemning “Israel” for its conduct during “Operation Protective Edge.”

2018 May: Official state delegation from Haryana visits “Israel” and meets with Mossad to sharpen their “intelligence gathering skills” for uprisings and agitations.

2019 August: With the abrogation of Articles 370 and 35A, India effectively annexes Kashmir. About 50,000 troops deployed, communications suspended, and thousands of Kashmiris arrested. “Israel” expresses support for the abrogation in September.

November: The Consulate General of India in New York calls for India to institute the “Israeli model” in Kashmir — building settlements to promote the so-called “return” of Hindus to Kashmir.

2021 TS Tirumurti, India’s Permanent Representative to the UN, describes “Israel’s” strikes on Gaza as “retaliatory” and not acts of aggression.

India abstains from the UN resolution demanding “Israel” provide adequate investigation resources to UNSCIP.

2023 January Adani Group, one of India’s largest and most politically powerful conglomerates, acquires a majority stake (70 percent) in the Haifa Port. The deal is meant to draw India into the Middle East and Europe and help “Israel” integrate deeper into the Middle East and the Far East.

May India signs an agreement to provide 42,000 Indian workers for “Israel’s” construction and care-giving sectors, substituting the labor of 70,000 Palestinians whose work permits are revoked.

September Establishment of India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEC), which seeks to build a new transit corridor to consolidate American economic and political interests. IMEC aims to counter China’s Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) by strengthening relationships between the UAE, “Israel,” and India through rail and shipping lines.

October India declines to call for a ceasefire in Gaza at UN GA. Narendra Modi is among the first world leaders to condemn Hamas.

2010 India flies “Israeli” drones over Chhattisgarh, Orissa, and Andhra Pradesh to surveil Maoist resistance groups.

2011 India abstains from vote calling on the International Criminal Court (ICC) to investigate “Israeli” war crimes.

2014 India becomes the world’s largest buyer of weapons from the Zionist entity, with 42.1% of all “Israeli” arms exports landing in India.

2017 July: Narendra Modi becomes first Indian PM to visit “Israel,” announcing a “strategic partnership” between the two countries.

2020 India abstains from voting on UN GA resolution demanding “Israeli” cooperation with Special Committee to Investigate Israeli Practices Affecting the Human Rights of the Palestinian People (UNSCIP).

2022 India abstains from UN GA resolution calling for the International Court of Justice (ICJ) to assess “Israel’s” “prolonged occupation” of Palestinian land.

July: First meeting of I2U2, a new trade bloc comprising “Israel,” India, the US, and the UAE, providing American political and financial protections for violence committed by right wing governments in “Israel,” India, and the UAE.

2024 January India sends combat drones to “Israel” for potential use in Gaza.

February Water Transport Workers Federation of India vow not to load or offload ships carrying weapons to “Israel.”

April Indian workers arrive in “Israel” to take on jobs denied to Palestinians.

April India refuses to sign the UN Human Rights Council Resolution calling for suspension of arms sales to “Israel.”

March Under Modi’s Make in India initiative, “Israel” Aerospace Industries (IAI) sets up an Indian subsidiary to develop missiles for the Indian army.

June Indian right-wing political commentator Anand Ranganathan calls for “Israel-like” solution in Kashmir.
